LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Hello Anthropologists and Friends,

This has been a year of accomplishments, changes, and challenges. In 2018 we celebrated the 60th birthday of the Gordon L. Grosscup Museum of Anthropology with a display of 60 objects selected from our collections. The exhibit opening was a huge success attended by over a hundred people. Ongoing visits to the exhibits have been continuous including one from the Michigan Congressional Delegation visiting the state from Washington DC.

Krysta Ryzewski received the prestigious WSU Career Development Chair, allowing her leave time and resources to complete her new book.

Our efforts to provide training in public and applied anthropology for our students are paying off. Associate Prof. Yuson Jung led a collaboration with Nissan Corporation and the Hearst Agency to study the acceptability of fully automated cars, *Confidence Behind the Wheel: An Ethnographic Study of Nissan's Safety Technology Features User Experience (UX).* Ten students participated in this project as their MA practicum. This project extends our work in user experience and design ethnography. All ten students in the Chevy project have found jobs or are pursuing Ph.D. degrees. Further, findings from the Chevy project, also known as "Call Me Out" were featured by GM CEO, Mary Barra, in the end of year report to shareholders as one of the four most important accomplishments by GM.

We haven't ignored our undergraduate majors. In summer 2019 5 undergraduate majors collaborated with TechTown in a project led by Ph.D. graduate, Dr. Marlo Rencher, to provide technical support for Start Studio, which is TechTown Detroit's newest three-month program for people at the idea stage of starting their tech business. Our students helped the startup teams develop research designs to help them identify a market and assess the consumers' needs. These paid internships provided invaluable training for these undergraduates. This internship was made possible through the exemplary efforts of our academic advisor, Mr. Harman Singh. Mr. Singh replaced retiring Sue Villerot but was transferred to Psychology when one of their advisors left. We now share Ms. Gayle McCreedy with History. Ms. McCreedy is doing an outstanding job: Welcome Gayle!

We welcomed our first MD-PHD student, Michael Drasher, who comes to us from Partners in Health having worked in Sierra Leon for several years. Three of our doctoral students (Colleen Linn, Kate Blanchard, and Slava Pallas) have been accepted to the NSF funded T-RUST (Training in Research in Urban Sustainability and Transformation) program, described last year.

Allen has generously committed to matching all donations made to the EPIC fund 2 to 1.

Finally, our long time and much, much loved academic services officer, Susan Villerot retired. I am happy to report that she and husband Hank Villerot are enjoying well earned respite by touring the west and southwest and in general having a great time.





LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



Charles (Chuck) Orser, Jr. (MA 1975) was

honored at the annual meeting of the Society for Historical Archaeology with a lifetime achievement award, the J.C. Harrington Award. Orser is an anthropological historical archaeologist who investigates the modern world as it was created after about 1492. He gained his experience in historical archaeology in the United States (eastern and southern), Europe (Ireland),

and South America (Brazil). He is the author of over 90 professional articles and a number of books, including *Historical Archaeology*, *A Historical Archaeology of the Modern World*, *The Archaeology of Race and Racialization in Historic America*, *Race and Practice in Archaeological Interpretation*, and *Unearthing Hidden Ireland: Historical Archaeology at Ballykilcline*, *County Roscommon*. He is also the founder and continuing editor of the International Journal of Historical Archaeology.
