Greetings Anthropology Community!

2016 was a productive and successful year for the **WSU** Anthropology Department. We had a successful search to replace the irreplaceable Todd Meyers and were able to hire Jonathan Stillo from CUNY. Jonathan, profiled later in this newsletter, has been an important addition to the WSU faculty with his extensive experience, even so early in his career, working with international health agencies. Our department has hosted several national and international conferences in the past year. The faculty and graduate students have been the recipients of several awards, published numerous articles and books, received external funding, and placed our students in prestigious positions both within and outside academia.

We are close to meeting our long-term goals for graduate training. In the past three years we have doubled the number of masters students while restructuring the graduate program to guarantee three years of funding to incoming doctoral students thus making the program more nationally competitive.

Life is going well in the department. Although we have not been able to achieve our goal of finding a home for the entire department and especially for finding a secure location for the GLG museum, we continue to work on this challenge. This semester we are inaugurating a lecture series for outside speakers, titled "Compassion, Morality and Ethics" and will also host the Midwest Meso-American Archaeology Conference in March.

We encourage you to stay in touch, attend the lecture series, and join us in our outreach efforts to spread the understanding of anthropological concepts and knowledge to the wider communities in which we live.






Krysta Ryzewski wins Research Award

New Faculty Member in Anthropology Jonathan Stillo

Jonathan Stillo is our new Medical Anthropologist from the City University of New York Graduate Center. As a medical anthropologist his research focuses on the social aspects of health, especially epidemic diseases such as tuberculosis (TB). He is interested in issues of health and human rights, anti-microbial resistance, health disparities among vulnerable populations.

Stillo has received research grants from the US National Science Foundation, Fulbright-Hays Commission (Funded by the US Department Education), The Social Science Research Council, Fulbright IIE (Funded by the US State Department), The International Research and Exchanges Board (Funded by the US Dept. of State Title VII), The Romanian Cultural Institute, The Council for European Studies, and among others. Since 2006, he has researched tuberculosis (TB) in Romania—including living at a Romanian TB sanatorium for several months—interviewing hundreds of patients and medical personnel across the country. Jonathan has served as an International Expert on the World Health Organization teams that conducted the 2014 review of Romania's national TB program, as well as the TB program review in Republic of Moldova in 2013, has served as a TB consultant for The US Embassy in Bucharest, and has helped develop multiple regional and national-level guidelines and expert opinion documents for European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC). He is planning a future project in Detroit examining TB among African Americans with diabetes and among recent migrants to the USA. In addition to his research activities, Stillo is an advocate for improved TB diagnosis and care, is a member of the Global TB Community Advisory Board and is a Steering Committee member of the TB Europe Coalition.

Stephen Chrisomalis Awarded NSF Grant

Wayne State University's Math Corps recently received a nearly \$3 million grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to develop and study the replication of its award-winning mathematics enrichment and mentoring program, which operates during summers and on Saturdays. Stephen Chrisomalis, associate professor and graduate director in Wayne State's Department of Anthropology in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, is one of the project's co-principal investigators. He has been involved in doing research on Math Corps since 2008 and has written two previous articles about the program.



Andrew Newman wins CLAS Teaching Award

Andrew Newman, assistant professor and a scholar of urban anthropology, has played a key role in the department's initiative, Anthropology of the City. He has engaged his students in the study of our city in a variety of hands-on ways, making a large difference in their lives. A model of the engaged scholar, he is an expert in the cultivation of experiential learning.

Professor Ryzewski's scholarly work crosses disciplinary borders between her home field of anthropology and allied areas of history and engineering.
