

## Psychology department responds to trauma, terror and war

The Wayne State University department of psychology hosted a lecture by Norine Johnson, president of the American Psychological Association (APA) and a graduate of WSU's doctoral program in clinical psychology, on "Psychology Responds to Trauma, Terror and War."

Over the course of her 30-year career, Dr. Johnson has demonstrated an unwavering commitment and strong leadership to the service of psychology with initiatives in professional

practice, education and training and in public interest.

An assistant professor of neurology at the Boston University Medical School, she chaired several committees within APA prior to becoming president. She has been repeatedly honored for her service both to APA and to the Massachusetts Psychological Association.

Joseph Jacobson, chair of the WSU department of psychology, views the visit as important on several levels.

to the preparation of undergraduate and graduate students for careers in psychology and related disciplines," Dr. Jacobson said.
