Course Description: Consideration of major contemporary social problems which reveal structural strains, value conflicts, deviations and changes in society. Analysis of socio-cultural factors creating problems and of possible solutions

Course Objectives

- To have a basic understanding of the social problems human society is facing.
- To have a brief overview of some contemporary sociological theories and theorists that explains social problems.
- To be able to look at social problem and apply multiple theories to explain what is happening.
- To open your mind and see society in a different way.

Measurement of Course Objectives

- There will be five multiple choice quizzes given during the semester. Each will include the identification and definition of key terms from three chapters.
- The quizzes and exams will ask you to apply the three main sociological theories' to fictional social problems.

- The quizzes and exams will ask you to interpret social (real or fictional) problems using key terms and theories.
- Midterm and Final will assess the students ability to use the material presented in class, discussed in class and read in the text to analyze a real life social phenomena in its entirety.
