Course Description: Analysis of the nature of violence in family and family-like relationships; prevalence and types of family violence; social and social psychological correlates of violence in families.

Course Objectives:

- Define and discuss the types of family violence.
- Discuss causes and factors associated with family violence.
- Understand the prevalence and frequency of family violence.
- Discuss the theories used to explain family violence.
- Learn how family violence is identified.
- Discuss methods used to prevent and eradicate family violence.
- Discuss how policies are used to treat victims and perpetrators of family violence.

General Course Policies and Guidelines

Quizzes: Three online quizzes will be given throughout the semester. These quizzes are multiple choice and will help students review for each exam. Each quiz is worth 25 points and all three are worth a total of 75 points. Please note: Quizzes will be made available at least one week before their accompanying exam and cannot be made up.

Examinations: You will have three online examinations. Each exam is worth 100 points. The questions in each exam cover all the material assigned to that point from the last exam. All exams will be multiple choice and given to students via Blackboard. If you know that you are going to miss an exam, please contact me at least 24 hours before the scheduled exam (if possible) to make arrangements to take the exam. If you fail to provide advanced notice and miss

an exam, you will not be allowed to take the exam unless you have extenuating circumstances which must be verified.

Writing Assignment (Article Summaries or Research Paper): Select one of the options below. Once you make your choice, please note that you cannot change at a later date. For example, if you submit one article summary, you cannot switch to the research paper. If you do not submit the first article summary, you cannot decide at a later date to submit the others as I will expect a research paper from you.

Article Summary: Select three articles from any peer-reviewed journal about an aspect of family violence. Each summary is worth 50 points and should include the following: purpose of the research, hypotheses, data and methods, and your opinion of the article/research. Indicate in your summary if you think this research is important and explain your position. Each summary submitted should be 3-4 pages in length and formatted in accordance to APA guidelines. Papers that are not formatted appropriately will not be graded. Please pay attention to grammar, punctuation and spelling. Article summary number one is due by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, September 24, 2016. Article summary number two is due by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 22, 2016. Article summary number three is due by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 19, 2016. Summaries must be submitted via Blackboard. Summaries will not be accepted via email. Summaries will not be accepted late.

Research Paper: Select a family violence topic and write one research paper on the topic. Undergraduates should submit a paper that is between eight and 10 pages, while graduate students should submit a paper that is between 15-20 pages. Please note the cover page and reference page is not included in the page count. Please format the papers in accordance to APA guidelines. Papers that are not formatted in accordance to APA guidelines will not be graded. Please use only scholarly and reputable sources to complete this assignment. This paper should be submitted by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 19, 2016 via Blackboard. The paper will not be accepted via email. Papers will not be accepted late.

Book Review (Graduate Students Only). Please select one book on a family violence topic of interest and complete one book review. A guideline to writing book reviews is available on Blackboard. It is recommended that you review the handout prior to completing the assignment. Please get your book approved by me prior to completing this assignment. This assignment is due by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 12, 2016 via Blackboard. The book review will not be accepted via email. Late book reviews will not be accepted.

Presentation (Graduate Students Only): Prepare a 10-minute presentation on a family violence topic. The presentation should clearly identify your topic of interest. A minimum of five sources are required for this assignment. A maximum of two popular sources are allowed. Students should upload their presentations and reference sheet to Blackboard before the due date. If you would like, you may present on the book you have reviewed. If you choose to present on the book you reviewed, create a brief presentation/outline and submit it via Blackboard. The presentation is due at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 22, 2016. Be prepared to present in class. Late presentations are not allowed.

Extra Credit: Extra credit assignments will not be given in SOC 5870. Students will however be allowed to obtain extra points because extra questions will be placed on the three examinations given during the semester. There is an opportunity to earn a maximum of 25 extra credit points in this course. Five (5) extra credit questions will be placed on exam #1 and 10 extra credit questions will be placed on exam #2. Ten (10) extra credit questions will be placed on exam #3. No other extra credit will be given to students in the class.

Challenging Grades: If you believe that you have been graded unfairly on any assignment, you must address your concerns to me in writing. You should provide specific points. For example, if you believe that a multiple- choice question was graded incorrectly, you most provide evidence from the course book(s) to document your statement. Once I have reviewed your request for a grade change, one of several things may happen: If you are able to show that you are correct your grade will be changed. I may request an in person meeting if I need more clarification on your argument. If you still feel after this process that your grade is not reflective of your effort, your next line of appeal would be through the Sociology Department. Be advised that challenged grades can result either in an increase, a decrease or no change in the grade.
