Course Description: Sociology literally means "the study of the social." Since almost everything we do, from interacting in a classroom to collectively waging war on each other is social, sociology is more precisely defined as "the systematic and/or scientific study of human social interactions." This course is designed to introduce you to the language, major theoretical models, methodology and concepts in the discipline of Sociology. Throughout the course, you will be applying the principles of Sociology to the social interactions that are happening all around you. This will enable you to see how your life and the lives of others are greatly influenced by the common social structure and historical period in which we are all living.

Learning Outcomes:

Specifically, in this course you will have the opportunity to:

- 1) Develop an understanding of and apply the sociological perspective to the world in which you live.
- 2) Develop an understanding of the basic elements of the scientific process.
- 3) Develop a "theoretical tool bag" that you can draw from to further understand the observations that you make in the social world.
- 4) Learn about yourself by applying course content to your everyday experiences in the social world.
- 5) Cultivate abstract and critical thinking skills.

- 6) Work on your reading, writing, and verbal skills (DUH!)
- 7) Have fun while learning in a judgement free classroom!

Course Policies:

Blackboard/Email: Blackboard and your WSU email will be used extensively in this course. **Please check your WSU email every day for important information regarding class.** Blackboard will also be used in this course. I will post any handouts on blackboard so that you may have an electronic copy in addition to a hard copy. Exams will be taken on blackboard (see course requirements for more information). **Please let me know ASAP if you need assistance in navigating blackboard.** I would hate to see anyone miss an assignment or exam due to struggling with blackboard.

<u>Late Work Policy:</u> Late work is not accepted unless you have a **VERIFIABLE** excuse (e.g. a note from your physician documenting your illness, including a date of return) and or we work something out <u>prior</u> to your absence.

Extra Credit: Extra credit may be given sparingly throughout the semester. I will announce extra credit in class. Any handouts that are required for extra credit will only be distributed in class.

<u>Use of Technology:</u> The use of electronics in class is distracting to you, me, and your fellow students, and disrupts the learning process. Therefore, all phones, pages, and other electronic devices should be turned off or turned to silent (NOTE: Vibrate is not silent) before the class period begins. Students should also refrain from texting, Facebooking, tweeting, reading the latest on BuzzFeed or surfing the web during class time. If you are using a laptop during class time, please use it for note-taking purposes only, and sit in the front row of the classroom. I reserve the right to lower students' participation/attendance grades if students are online or on their devices during class time.

<u>Coming to Class Late/ Leaving Early:</u> Please have the courtesy to let me know in advance if you must leave class early, and sit close to the door so that you may leave with the least disruption to the class as possible.

Attendance: Regular class attendance is expected. Excessive absences will inevitably be reflected in your final course grade. If there is a problem with getting to class on time or having to leave early, please see me as soon as possible. You are all adults and are capable of making the decision to attend class. In cases where you are unable to attend class you are responsible for obtaining missed information from a classmate. I will not provide students with my lecture notes nor will I reiterate lectures for individual students. In the case of an emergency, where excessive absences result, please contact me as soon as possible so that I can work with you.

<u>Judgement Free Classroom:</u> Due to the nature of the topic of this course, some points discussed in class may be controversial, uncomfortable or lead to heated debates. Learning something new isn't always comfortable and often our personal judgments cloud our ability to learn to the fullest. Please try to keep those judgments outside of the 'classroom' and focus on gaining new knowledge while in class or reading the assigned texts. If you have strong feelings about anything brought up in class by either your fellow classmates or me, please feel free to make an appointment to come speak with me. I am more than willing to listen to your concerns.

Course Requirements:

Exams: There will be two exams in this course. One of the exams will be a midterm and the other will be a final exam. The midterm will be worth 100 points and the final will be worth 108 points. Exams are to be completed online through blackboard and will be timed. You will have 2 and a half hours to complete the exam. You may take the exam on any day during the week the exam is assigned. Exams will be open from 12 am on Thursday until 11:59pn on Sunday evening. There will be multiple choice questions in addition to 2 short essay questions. A study guide will be posted two weeks before each exam. More details about each exam will be given when we get closer to each exam date.

<u>Quizzes:</u> There will be weekly quizzes under each week's lesson on Blackboard. The purpose of these quizzes is to help you in solidifying your understanding of the material from each week. You can find the weekly quizzes in a separate folder within each lesson. Quizzes will be based on information from the textbook as well as any assigned supplementary reading. You will have unlimited attempts to take each quiz. The latest attempt that you submit will be graded. Quizzes will be available on Monday of each week at 12 AM (Midnight) and will be open until Thursday of each week until 11:59pm. See the course schedule for specific due dates for each quiz. Quizzes are worth 10 points each for a total of 110 points (11 quizzes for the semester).

SYLLABUS QUIZ: There will be one quiz during the first week of class over the syllabus. It is important for you to know the details of what is expected of you in this course. Just like the other quizzes, this quiz will be open during the first week of class starting on Thursday, August 31 at 12 am and will close at 11:59pm on Monday, September 4. This quiz will be worth 20 points and you will have unlimited attempts to take it.

<u>Participation:</u> 100 points of your course grade will be from your attendance in the class and participation. Excessive absences (more than 2) will result in not only you falling behind but a poor participation grade. I will deduct 2 points for every class period that you miss beyond 2 absences. The classroom is a learning environment that we should all feel comfortable in. Please let me know if there is anything that would be helpful in making the classroom environment more comfortable for you to engage in class discussion. I expect that everyone will come to class regularly and engage in the process of learning through discussion and paying attention in class (I can tell when you are writing letters to that special someone instead of paying attention). You cannot earn participation points if you are not in class.

<u>Breaking a Norm Essay:</u> In this course, you will write one essay. For this essay will involve you going out and breaking a social norm and then writing an essay about your experiences. The essay itself should be 3-4 pages long (see the Breaking a Social Norm Assignment Sheet) for more information about content, style, and formatting. This assignment will be worth 50 Points and will be due by Sunday, October 15 via blackboard.

A Few Tidbits of Important Information: I will try my best to make sure that ALL assignments that are turned in are graded within one week of submission of the assignment. Providing timely feedback is important for your learning process and understanding of the course material. Of course, if something drastic happens and I am not able to provide feedback within one week, I will let you know so that you are not left wondering. All assignments will be turned in on blackboard. If you experience any technical issues with blackboard, please let me know so that I can get the issue resolved as soon as possible. You can also contact the I.T. department here at WSU if you need technical assistance ASAP.
