#### **COURSE OBJECTIVE**

This course should enable the student to become aware of the sociological perspective and use this perspective to critically examine social problems. More specifically, in this course you will have the opportunity to:

- (1) Develop an understanding of and learn how to apply the sociological perspective toward understanding societal problems.
- (2) Use your sociological imagination to envision solutions to social problems.
- (3) Cultivate abstract and critical thinking skills.
- (4) Engage in intellectual discussions with your classmates.
- (5) Work on your reading, writing, and verbal skills.

## **OPERATION OF THE COURSE**

This course will consist of lecture, class discussions, videos and small group projects based on the videos. Students are encouraged to both ask questions and participate in class discussions. Chances are that certain topics in this course will generate wide-ranging opinions in the class. Please show **respect for your fellow students**, even if they present viewpoints that differ from your own.

In addition, please contact me if you are having any difficulty in the class or visit me during office hours.

The course will follow the order listed in the class schedule. However, the instructor may make changes as necessary. Any changes will be communicated to the students during class time and on Blackboard.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- 1) **There will be a total of 4 exams during the semester.** This includes the final exam. Exams are not cumulative per se, but do require you to incorporate prior knowledge concerning sociological theories that are taught early in the semester to all of the class exams. Much of the exam will include concepts discussed that are not in your text book; therefore, attendance is very important. If you miss one exam, you will be allowed one makeup exam to be taken no more than 7 days after the due date, if you notify your instructor prior to the exam date. No more than one makeup exam will be allowed.
- 2) Homework will consist of reading the assigned materials and completing 3 papers that count for 25 points each. No late work will be accepted. Each assignment should be a minimum of 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to a maximum of 3 pages, double-spaced and typed.
- 3) You will have a **quiz on the syllabus the second class period.** Understanding the syllabus is essential to your success in the class. In addition, **there will be 2 pop quizzes given throughout the semester worth 20 points each.** These quizzes will not be announced in advance. These quizzes will help me assess your understanding of the assigned reading material. If you are absent during a class where there is a quiz, there is no make-up option.
- 4) There will be 3 videos shown throughout the semester, with **group work** activities associated. These group work activities will be worth 20 points each.

## **CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS**

At the beginning of each class, I will have a sign-in sheet and handouts that supplement your textbook readings. Although you are not awarded points for attendance, it is extremely important that you attend class regularly because a significant amount of what you will learn will be through lectures and class discussions and will not necessarily come from your textbook. Try not to be late to class and if you are, please sit in the back of the classroom and sign in and get your handouts at the end of class so as not to be disruptive to the other students.

**Please TURN OFF YOUR CELL PHONE (or put it on mute or vibrate) prior to entering the classroom.** If you have an emergency situation, please raise your hand and ask to be excused from class to conduct your phone business outside the classroom.
